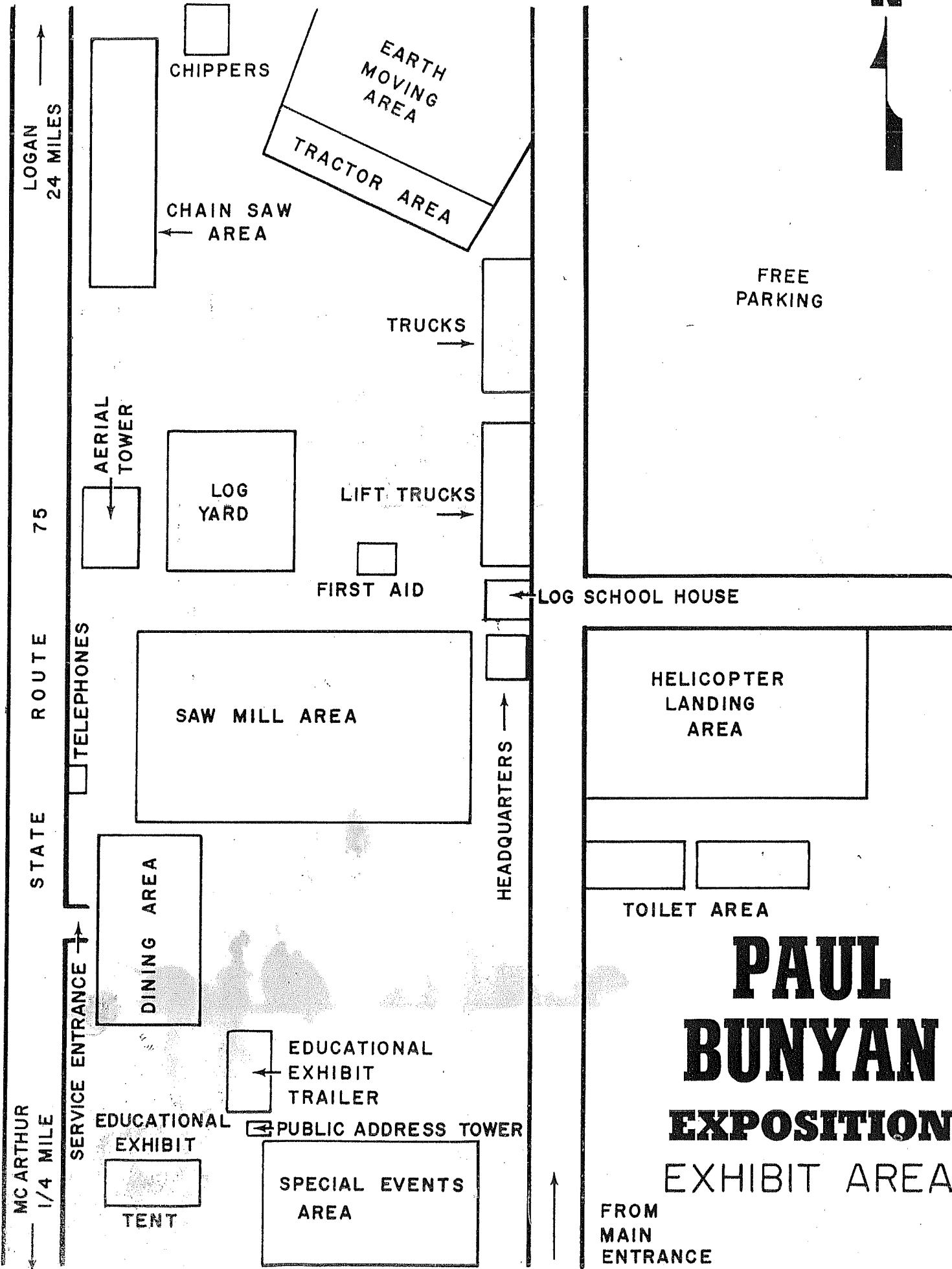

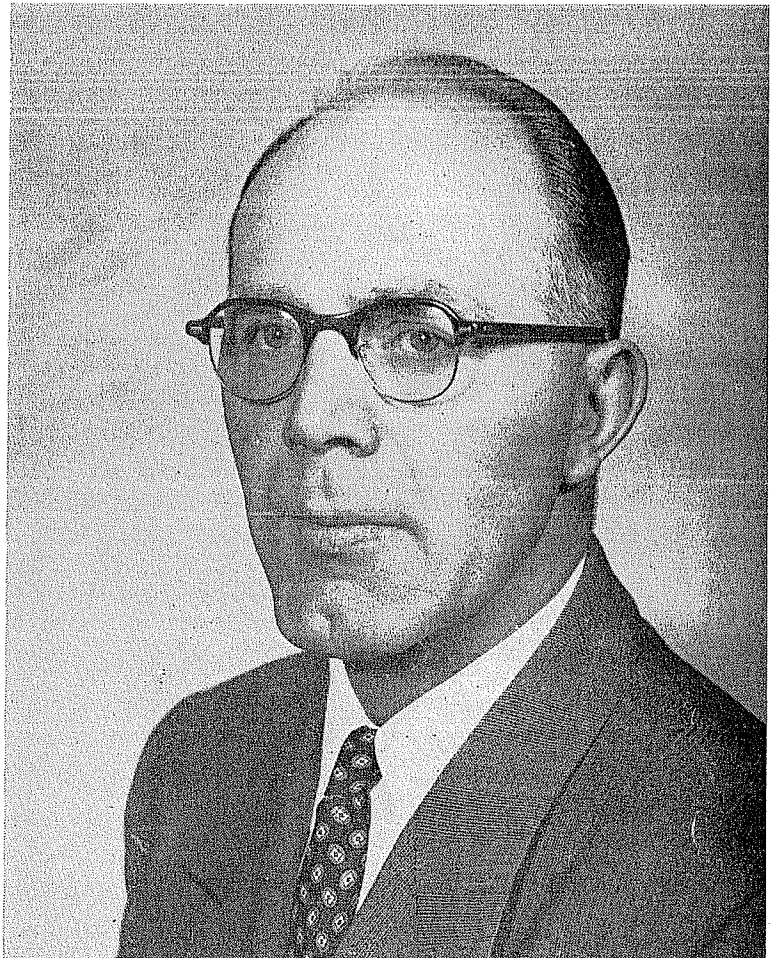

TREE FARM

A sound forest economy built around the Tree Farm program of growing timber as a crop on taxpaying lands is putting new muscles in the industrial march of the mighty Midwest.

Just 11 years after Ohio activated this voluntary, industry-operated movement to increase timber production through forest management, tree farming has won its spurs in the state's agricultural and industrial surge.

Today there is at least one certified Tree Farm program in

each of Ohio's 88 counties. Through tree farming Ohioans have grasped the "timber is a crop" concept and converted into new economic fiber for a burgeoning economy.

The strength of Ohio's Tree Farm movement, it may be said, lies in the large number of small landowners who have dedicated their woodlands to repeated timber crops under principles of the American Tree Farm System. As of now the state has 425 Tree Farm ownerships—one of the country's leaders.

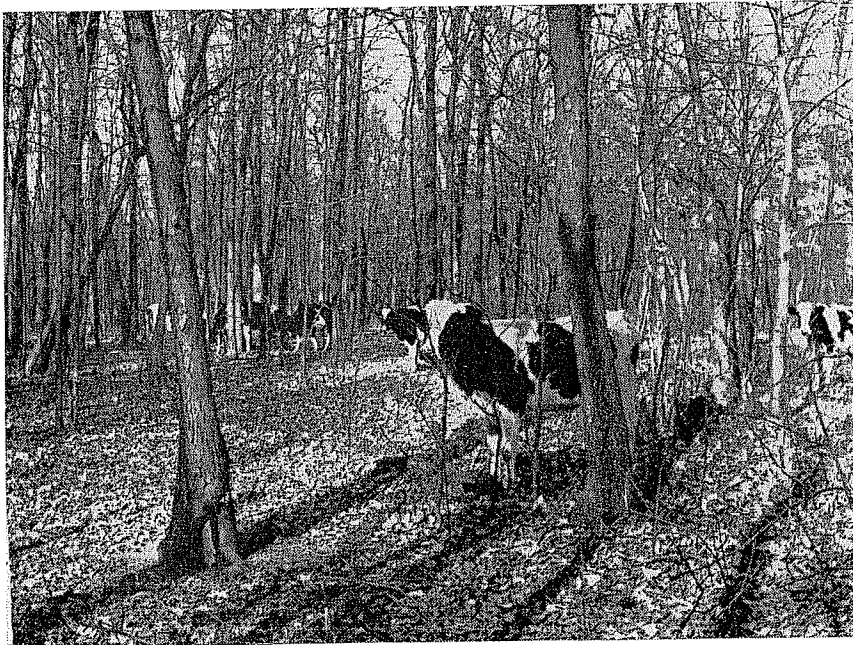
These Tree Farms embrace 102,513 acres of managed and protected timberlands.

Ohio's Tree Farm program was launched in 1946 under sponsorship of the Ohio Forestry Association and the Ohio Division of Forestry. Today the program is administered jointly by the Ohio Forestry Association and the Ohio Forest Industries Committee.

To qualify as a certified Tree Farm, timberland must undergo inspection by technical foresters. The owner must demonstrate his ability to protect his timber from fire, insects, diseases and destructive grazing; also, he must harvest to insure repeated crops. There are no membership dues nor assessments. Upon approval of his timber management practices, the owner receives a certificate of membership in the American Tree Farm System, also a green and white diamond-shaped sign which he may display on his property.

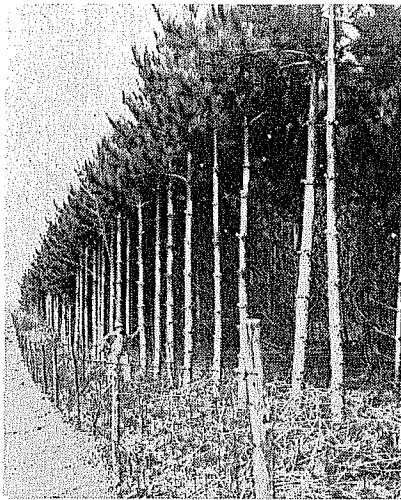
Over the past 20 years the forest area of Ohio has been increasing. Forest industries provide jobs for over 68,000 Ohioans. In trees of sawtimber size alone, Ohio has enough timber standing in the forests to build a five-room frame house for every person living in Cleveland and Cincinnati.

The sale of forest products

from their woodlots now bring Ohio farmers more than \$1,500,000 a year. A steady lumber industry and a booming pulp and paper industry provide Ohio tree farmers with markets for all forest products.

Tree Farm success stories abound in the rolling Ohio countryside, where diversification of crops help make Ohio agriculture the envy of the nation.

A Licking County tree farmer has produced all the lumber and posts needed on his farm; sold additional logs and lumber; cut 1,200 posts from a pine planting

made 20 years ago, and has sold \$1,000 worth of Christmas trees annually for the past 12 years or more.

A Medina County tree farmer makes about \$3,000 a year from maple syrup sales from his 93-acre forest. Also he has harvested beech trees to provide lumber for forest use. He plants about 500 trees a year on land not now producing crops.

An Athens County tree farmer conducts regular harvests on his 118-acre woodland. He has removed all mature timber and wolf trees. These harvests have produced about 300,000 board feet of hardwood lumber over a decade.

A Tuscarawas County tree farmer harvested 125,000 board feet of white oak from a 40-acre forest by selective cuttings during the past 10 years. At the same time he cut 5,000 board

feet of lumber for use on his own farm.

Because trees are renewable and replace themselves, the Tree Farm program is unlocking new doors of opportunity for the landowners of Ohio.

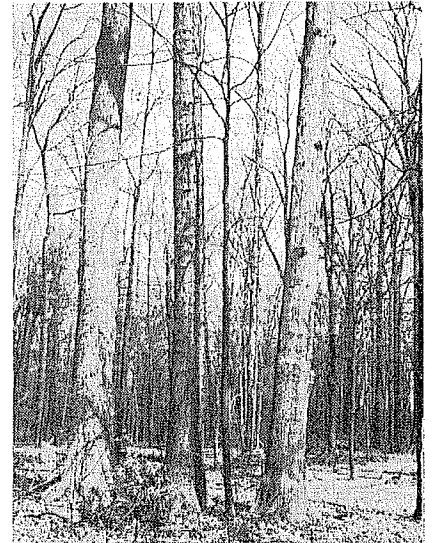


The early settlers in Ohio must have taken a great deal of pride in their labor as they saw their clearings gradually expand into farms. Each year more decaying stumps yielded to the plow until finally the deep fertile soil was free of all obstructions. The woods from which these new farms had been wrested were looked upon as unfriendly, ready to harbor enemies to the newcomer and ready to reclaim his cleared land at the first opportunity. True, they furnished wood for his home and fireplace and often food for his table, but they were still a barrier to agricultural progress

and could be destroyed without concern for the future.

Stories of land clearing are still passed down to the present generation, but now with special emphasis on the size of the trees destroyed and what they would be worth in the present market. A feeling of apprehension for the aftermath of this destruction was felt by public spirited citizens long before the close of the nineteenth century. What would happen when the timber supply was exhausted? What of the water supply, the soil on the longer and steeper slopes?

The growth of this concern and the resulting changes form



The original hardwood forests in Ohio had to be removed to make way for agriculture.

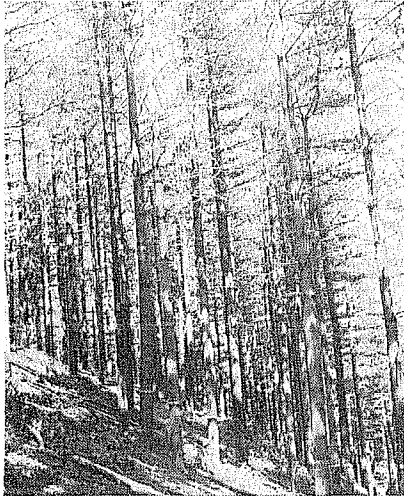
the basis of our forestry and land use history. Such changes are slow in coming and Ohio was no exception.

How many times the forests of southeastern Ohio burned over before the passage of the fire control laws in 1921 no one can guess. Many times, if the scars on old stumps tell even a partial story. How many times timber was removed from steep land with no thought of a second crop or the protection of the exposed soil will never be known.

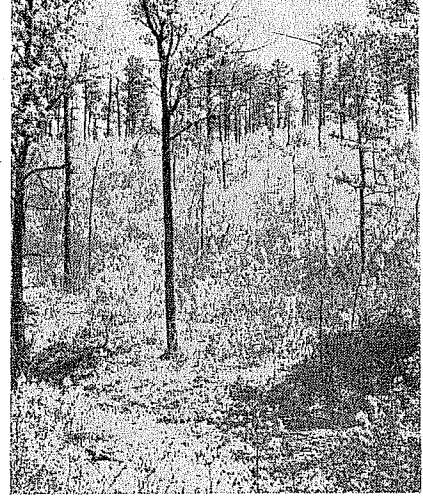
White pine has proved well adapted to many Ohio soils even after they have been impoverished by erosion.

It is heartening to know that nearly five million acres of eastern and southern Ohio now have organized fire protection, and that fire losses are held to low figures except in extreme seasons. Fires are seldom out of

control throughout the first night, whereas once they burned until the next general rain, often a week or more. Today clean young timber has replaced the burned snags on thousands of acres along the river hills. These young trees will soon be large enough to support local industries.

Likewise, the land left idle when soil erosion made many hilly farms unprofitable is being reforested both by man and nature. Trees in the state nurseries are being produced at the rate of 16 million per year to reforest these idle acres. Old plantations of forest trees on the state forests, welfare farms, and college lands furnish ample evidence of what might be expected from present day tree planting.

Forest acreage is on the increase in Ohio, the last figures showing a total area of 5,396,000

acres of commercial woodland. About 57% is in farm woods, 38% in industrial and other privately-owned land and 5% in public ownership. Much of this area is understocked, much is heavily grazed, and much is stocked with saplings and poles. It is generally believed, however, that growing trees as a crop is on the up-grade in Ohio, and that for the years immediately ahead the volume of usable timber produced annually will increase and that as more and more acres approach maximum yield the total available volume of wood will more than support the 1700 plus mills, and that new markets will spring up in areas of abundant supply.

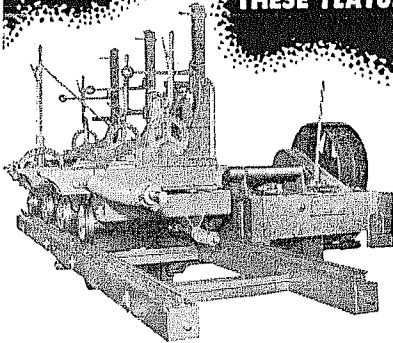
How quickly this will occur will depend upon the efforts of foresters, landowners and timber operators to work together in search of a combination of sound silviculture and profitable manufacture of wood into useful products.



In western Ohio the grazing of livestock is a serious threat to the future of the farm woods. Without the reproduction destroyed by the stock the woods will soon cease to exist.

4. All decisions of the judges in determining eligibility and winners will be final.
5. Contestants will be disqualified for any violation or breach of spirit pertaining to good sportsmanship.

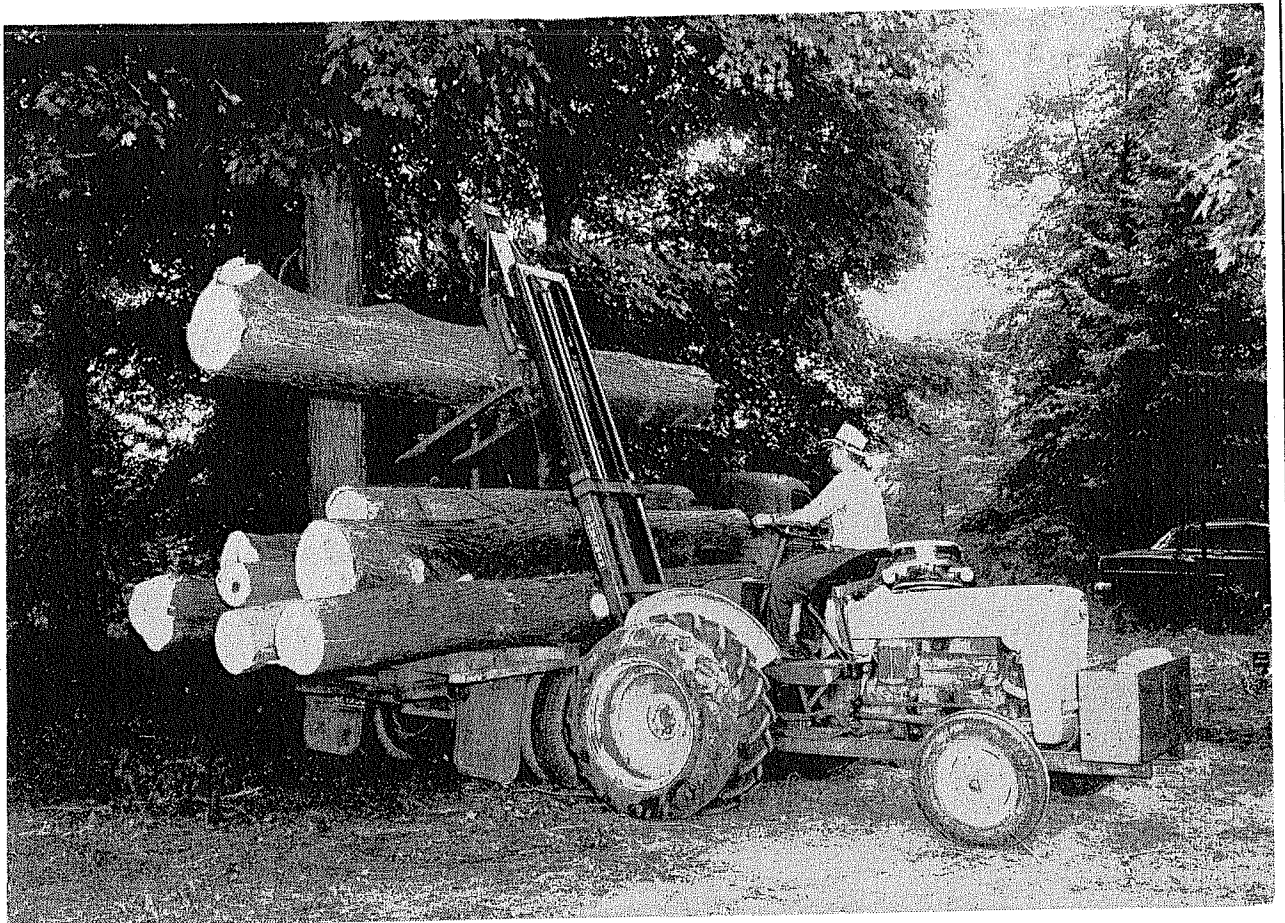

Checks for the winners will be mailed on September 30.

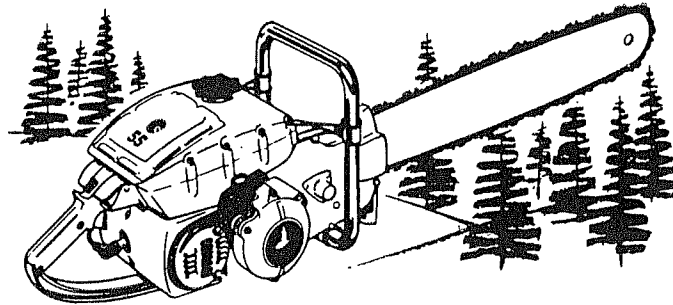

OHIO TIMBER

Two groups of people are needed to make forestry a success in Ohio; one group, the folks who own the land and grow the timber, and the other, the men who buy and harvest the crop. Others are important too; the foresters who add their technical knowledge; public agencies to distribute new information; fire control organizations; and others, but the cooperation of the growers and the buyers is fundamental to a sound, permanent program.

These two groups must work together if the program of forest conservation is to succeed. It was this belief that led a group of half-a-dozen timbermen to meet with the officials of Ohio Forestry Association in 1949 and ask them to include a timber industry project in the association's program. Prior to that there was no organized effort either to bring the men who buy the timber and the growers together, or to assist timbermen in meeting problems common to them all.

The Board of Trustees of O.F.A. considered this request, plus the offer of several industries to help finance the project and, believing that conservation

could be served by such cooperation, decided to include a timber industry program. It was their belief, also, that a sound timber industry was essential to the forestry program.

A Timber Industry Committee was named to plan and carry out a program and comprised the following industrial representatives:

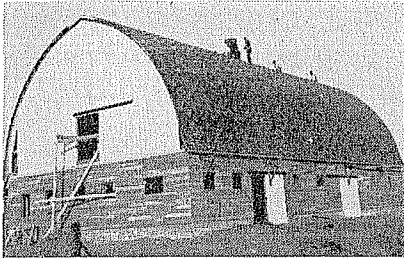
October 1950, Robert R. Paton, was employed as forester for the Association and was asked to assist the timberman with this new project as one of his several stated duties.

One of the earliest steps taken was to formulate a statement of policy for the O. F. A. to present to the timbermen. This was accomplished, and it

has been widely publicized and supported by the O. F. A. timber industry members.

Another step in promoting a sound industry was publication of the Forestry Marketing Bulletin. This is issued monthly as a service to the industry and carries items about new developments in the timber field, including legislative information, new regulations, new information in technical fields, as well as ads which the timbermen insert for equipment, wood products, special services, etc. This Bulletin goes to 400 timbermen in 5 states, but chiefly in Ohio.

Other services include legal counseling in matters which affect the entire industry.

Several timber industry conferences have been held to give all operators an opportunity to discuss their current problems, and there has been good attendance and good results.

Interest in conservation education among the timbermen has increased as indicated by several new developments. Each year the number of timber men who sponsor young people to the Forestry Training Camp increased until this year a third of the campers were sponsored by timbermen. Two years ago,

nearly a dozen Ohio timber firms bought tree planting machines and made them available to land owners either free of charge or for a nominal rental fee. These industry-owned tree planters are an indication of the long range interest in conservation of these firms, as is the support of the training camp.

The timbermen also sponsor the Tree Farm program in Ohio, in cooperation with the American Forest Products Industries which sponsor the program nationally. Ohio's Tree Farm activity places her high in the Nation in number of Tree Farms, their distribution (there is one or more in every county) and total acreage.

The timber industry committee is sponsoring the Paul Bunyan Forestry Expositions (this is the second of these) as a means of creating a realization of the importance of timber in Ohio, and the important relationship between the forest owner and the forest industries.

Other projects of service to the timbermen and forest land owners by the Timber Industry Committee include the following:

1. Sponsorship of two dry kiln short courses, at Columbus and Cleveland, attended by 70 operators.
2. Sponsorship of 5 day lumber grading course at Dover through the help of the Marsh Lumber Co.
3. Distribution of educational materials.
4. Arrangement for special tours through wood using plants.

5. Educational TV and radio broadcasts.

6. Exhibits at O. F. A. annual meetings.

7. Arrangement for special conferences between owners and timber buyers.

8. Cooperation with other agencies in their educational programs, including 4-H conservation camps.

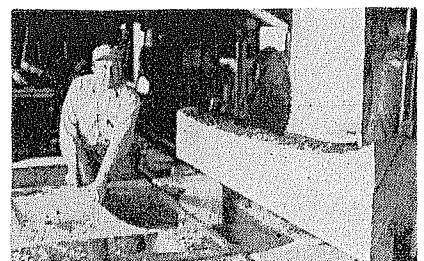

Ohio Division of Wildlife

Forestry and wildlife are important products of the land in many areas. Properly managed land will produce both abundantly. Generally, good forestry is good wildlife management. Land managed for both resources is more productive than land managed for either singly.

Managers of both resources should consider the long term resource needs and plan for sustained yields for the most efficient use of the land. Where they keep the modern concept of multiple use in mind, this is not difficult to do.

Wildlife needs food, cover, water and freedom from excessive disturbance. Solid stands of mature forests fail to provide maximum food and cover for forest game. A more desirable plan is to

have a forest composed of trees of all sizes and species—an all-age class forest as the foresters term it. In such a forest there are large trees to produce food and cover for deer, ruffed grouse and other forest wildlife. An all-age forest which provides all of these requirements for wildlife will support regular populations of many wildlife species year after year—a sustained yield—to be enjoyed by sportsmen, hikers, campers, picnickers, and others.

The same type of management will also produce a sustained yield of timber. Year after year a regular yield of timber will mature for harvest. This efficient system distributes income and prevents peak demands for labor and equipment so it is desirable forestry.

In the past recreational opportunity has been abundant in our land. As our population grows, less and less opportunity for recreation is available and the demand for this important tonic increases. The growing importance of restorative recreation—the contemplative pastimes—to our people has caused some authorities to comment that in the near future the major use of public forests east of the Mississippi River will be for this purpose rather than for the production of timber.

The destiny of foresters then, may be more closely tied up with providing recreation than in producing timber in areas of dense human population. The importance of wildlife in providing recreation to the public may cause foresters to



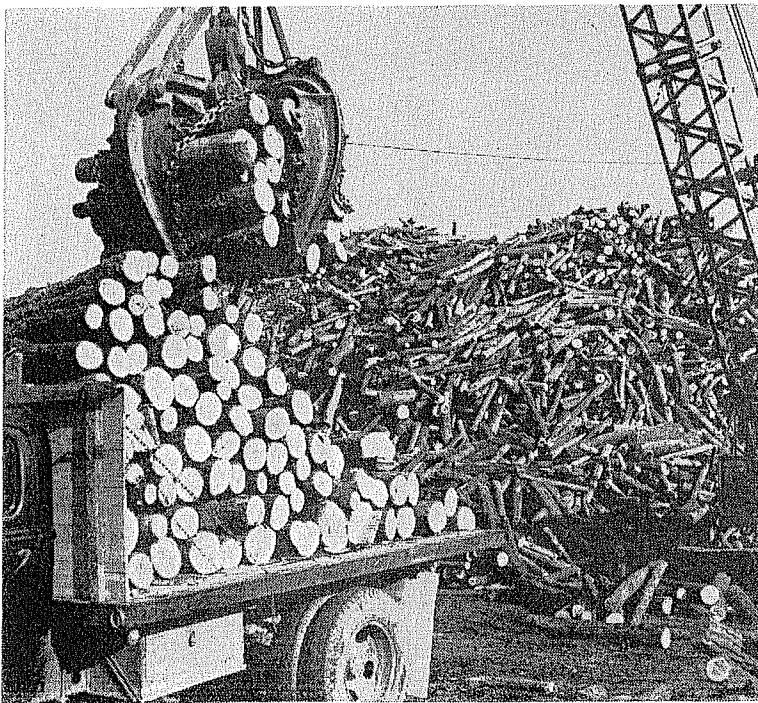

devote more of their effort to the task of providing for wildlife needs as they plan for forest management.

This is true of Ohio where even the hill country, formerly thought of as good only for less intensive uses, is now becoming industrial and more heavily populated. The quarter of a million acres of public forests are a tremendous recreation potential to our growing population.

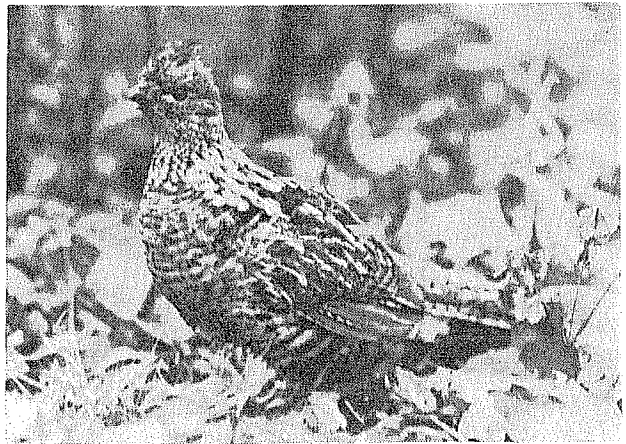
Our forests can be the means to a better life if they meet this need for restoring balance, and wildlife is a lively ingredient of the process. Thus, wildlife should be a careful part of the forest plan.

Thinnings in large, dense forests provide food and cover for wildlife. Selective harvest of timber produces the same result.

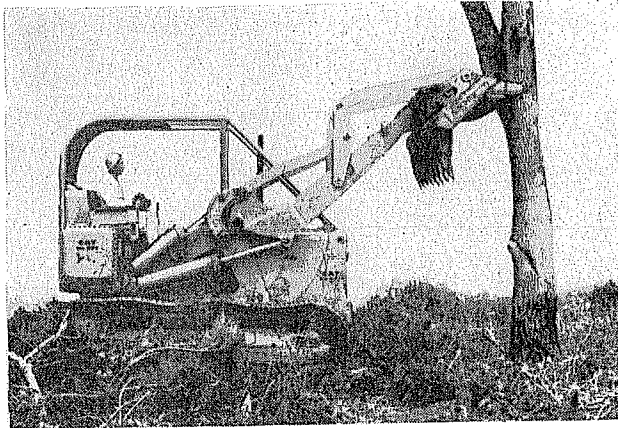


The ruffed grouse has been called the "king" of upland game birds. It lives in all-age forests.

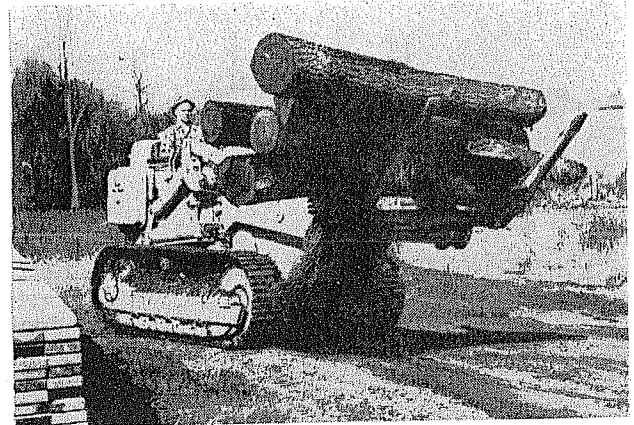


Reforestation of eroded hill sides will make land once again productive of wildlife.

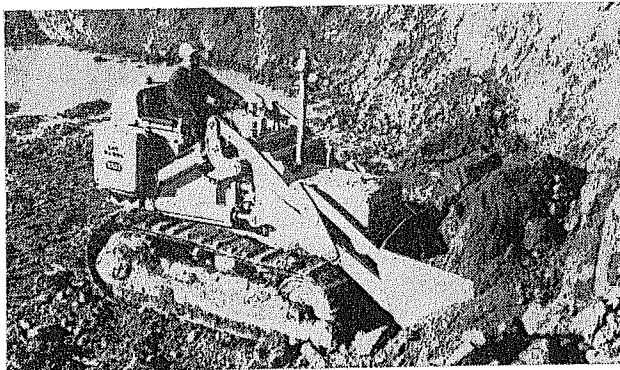

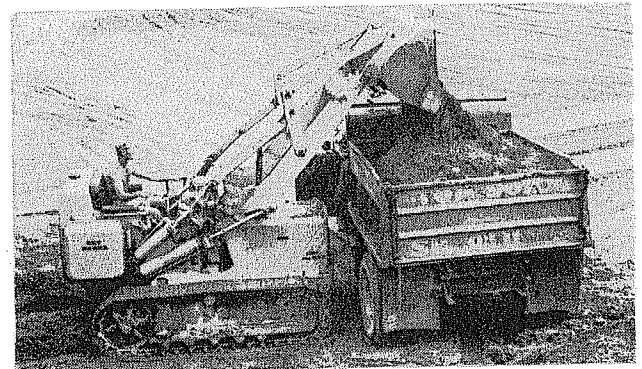

How it Happened

In scanning the records of the Association, we have found many interesting bits of information pertaining to the historical significance of this Association and its effect on the forestry and recreation program in Ohio. We thought you would like to have some of this background.

Ohio took early action relating to its forest resources. Between 1798 and 1818 laws were enacted against firing the woods and prairies, also to prohibit trespassing and cutting or damage to standing timber.

Widespread public interest in forest conservation was demonstrated by the organization, in 1833, of the Ohio Forestry Association. The Association published a report in 1884 declaring the need for a vigorous policy of scientific forest management in Ohio. This interest resulted in the establishment in 1885 of a State Bureau of Forestry. However, the Bureau was discontinued five years later.

The Ohio Forestry Association was revived on December 11, 1903 in Delaware, Ohio as the Ohio State Forestry Society with 55 charter members.

It is interesting to note the continuity of events as in 1904,

the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station initiated forest research, for the primary purpose of reforestation by planting.

The first annual meeting of the Association was held at Chillicothe, December 21-22, 1904. The first summer meeting was held on June 10, 1905, in joint session with the sixtieth anniversary of the Columbus Horticultural Society. Over 100 people were in attendance, many of whom were from a distance, and

the meeting was addressed by former Governor Myron T. Herrick, late Ambassador to France.

During the same year, it assisted in the organization of the Morrow County Forestry Association, the first of its kind in the country, which at one time had a membership of nearly 200.

At the second annual meeting held in Columbus, January 9-10, 1906, the Association urged:

1. The establishment of state forest reserves

2. Adequate farm forestry course in the College of Agriculture
3. The establishment of a four-year course in forestry at Ohio State University
4. The promotion and expansion of tree planting as a farm crop by the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station

(Note—These recommendations have been written into the Ohio Forestry Laws. The law creating the Department of Forestry at the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station was authorized in 1906. Its first leader was Ed-

mund Secret. Mr. Secret was appointed to the newly created position of State Forester in 1921. In 1937, he was made Director of the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station, and O. A. Alderman succeeded him as State Forester.)

A four-year course in forestry was established at Ohio State University in 1904 but was discontinued in 1918.

The annual meeting on January 3, 1911, "urged the Ohio Legislature to provide a suitable building for the students of forestry and horticulture at the Ohio State University and should receive favorable action

without further delay". The H and F building now stands on the campus. At the same meeting it was recommended "the establishment of forest parks devoted to the growing of natural forests for playground and recreational purposes . . . and state forests which would serve as excellent demonstrational and experimental areas". We now have our system of State Forests and State Parks.

On January 11, 1912, the Association asked the Ohio Legislature to provide for more efficient and effective laws to prevent the ravages of forest fires in southeastern Ohio—"to provide for a system of patrols during the season of greatest danger, whose duty it should be to detect and extinguish fires and enforce the laws". We now have an excellent State Forest Fire Protection system.

During the years of 1915 to 1925, the Association actively supported the Department of Forestry, Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station, by legislative action in purchasing state forest and park areas, adequate forest fire laws, and the establishment of a State Forest Nursery. Today the Ohio Division of Forestry operates 154,835.19 acres in State Forests and operates three State Forest nurseries.

The O F A has supported Farmers Week since 1914 and sponsored the forestry program annually (until recently) held on the campus of the Ohio State University.

During the past 25 years, the OFA has conducted educational tours to state forests and forest parks of the State, including outstanding private forest plantings. The first campfire program of the Association was held in September 1919, at Carbondale as guests of the Carbondale Coal Company. Colonel R. Enderlin, President of the Company and Superintendent Melvin Doolittle generously gave their time and facilities in making the meeting most successful.

This custom has been continued annually as part of the regular summer meeting program.

The Association sponsored the annual meeting of the American Forestry Association held at Cincinnati in June 1937. Not only did it assist in arranging the program, but furnished a guarantee of \$200 to make the meeting possible. There was an attendance of over 10,000 persons at the meeting.

In 1947, the Association gave

leadership in obtaining from His Excellency, the then Governor Frank J. Lausche, a study of state forestry administration in Ohio. This study was conducted by a joint committee of the Society of American Foresters and the Charles Lathrop Pack Forestry Foundation.

The study was undertaken for the purpose of defining and proposing standards for the efficient administration of the forest resources within the State and to make recommendations as to how these standards may be met.

The following is a summary of the recommendations published in the report of the survey in 1947.

1. The act passed in 1941, providing for a natural resource coordinating board composed of executives of the several land and water managing units, should be amended to provide funds for its effective administration and to require that

meetings be held at prescribed intervals.

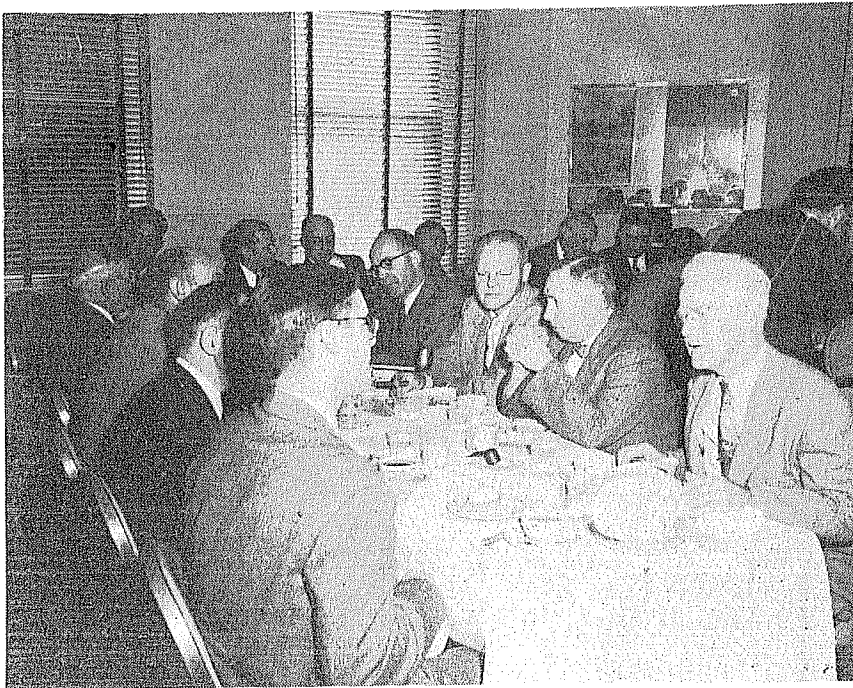
2. The Division of Forestry should have its general headquarters in Columbus, and the State Forester and his principal assistants should be located there.

3. The Division of Forestry should be vigorously supported as now set up, and so afforded further opportunity to demonstrate ability to carry on forestry work on an adequate scale.

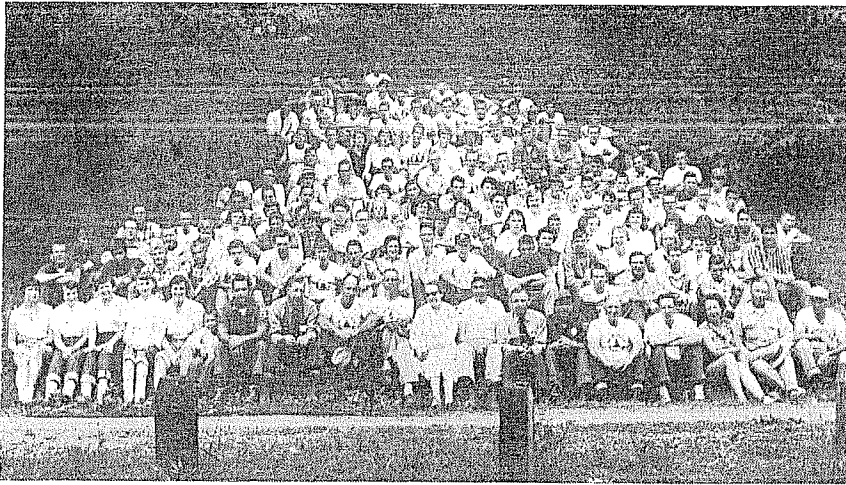
4. Clean-cut agreements should be executed by the Extension Service, the Soil Conservation Service, and the Division of Forestry covering the activities of each in farm forestry, with allocation of responsibility along functional lines, to the end that forestry shall be properly integrated in the programs of the Soil Conservation Districts and of the Extension Service.

5. The state in cooperation with the U.S. Forest Service should provide greatly increased aid to woodland owners so that expert assistance shall be available to all owners who request help in managing their forest properties and are prepared to carry out jointly agreed-upon action programs. Need for immediate employment by the State Forester of 8 additional foresters is indicated, for which an additional state appropriation of at least \$44,000 would be required, for each of the next five years.

6. A new forest nursery should be purchased and developed in the state so that the annual output of the Forestry Division's nurseries may be not less than 13 1/2 million trees. A total appropriation of approximately \$171,000 is needed in 1947 for old and new nurseries,



The OFA is governed by a responsible Board of Trustees who are elected by the membership. Half of the 26 member Board are elected each year for two-year terms.

including \$68,000 for land and buildings.

7. Careful programs of distribution, instruction of planters, and follow-up inspection should be developed and carried out by the Extension Service, the Soil Conservation Service, and the Division of Forestry to assure establishment of successful plantations.

8. The acquisition and development of a system of state forests and state forest parks, now well initiated, should be greatly enlarged and steadily continued with an objective of at least 600,000 acres in twenty years. Appropriations should be provided to acquire 25,000 acres or more every year.*

9. The Fiscal Control Board should delegate full responsibility for determining suitability for purchase of land for state forests and state forest parks to the Board of Control of the Agricultural Experiment Station. If deemed necessary by the Attorney General, legislation to this end should be enacted.

10. One or more abstract lawyers should be appointed by the Attorney General to work under his direction exclusively upon

abstracts of title for lands to be purchased as state forests and forest parks. A reasonable allowance for cost of abstracting borne by the landowner who sells should be added to the valuation estimate made by the state.

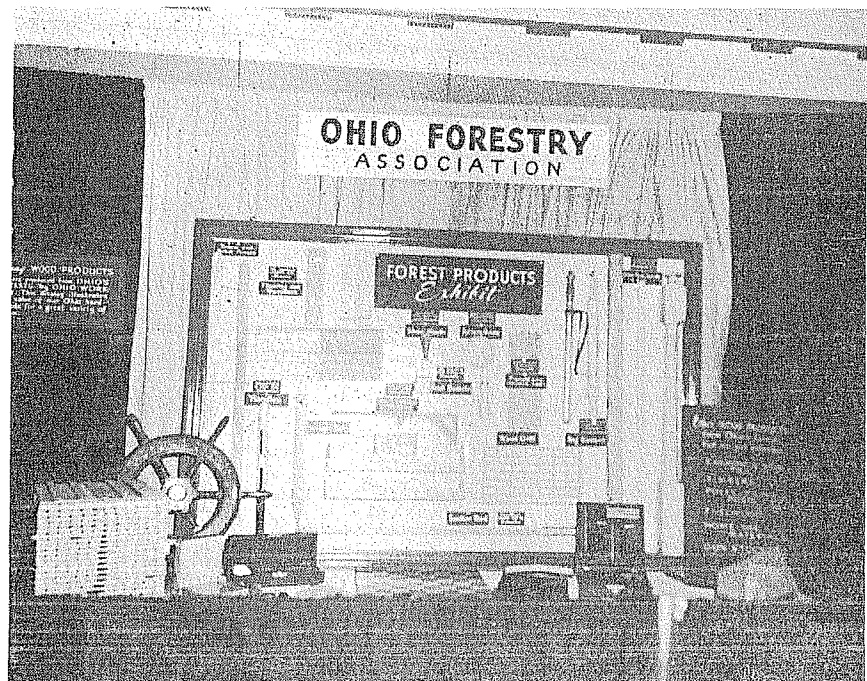
11. Increased state appropriations should be made to insure adequate forest fire control by

providing, in addition to federal funds, the following amounts: \$135,000 for calendar year 1947; \$150,000 for calendar year 1948; and \$184,000 for calendar year 1949.

12. Reconsideration should be given to the present plan of restricting the expenditures for a given object during a given quarter of the year to one-quarter of the yearly appropriation for that object, with such change in the law as may be appropriate.

13. The forest research conducted at the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station should be continued and increased; and adequate financial support should be provided by appropriation of at least \$20,000 per year.

14. Strong support should be given to the establishment by the U.S. Forest Service of a forest research center in Ohio, as an integral part of the Central States Forest Experiment Station. Such a center would great-

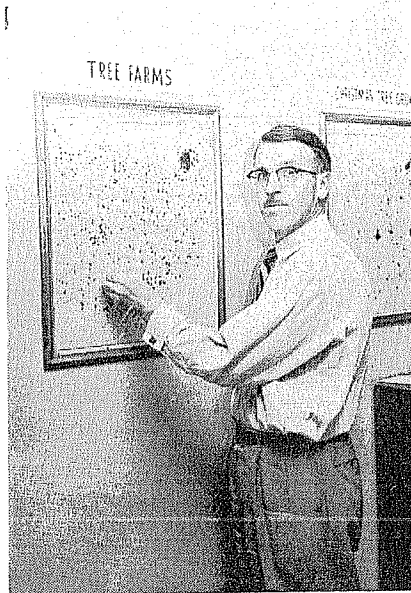
ly extend and facilitate the profitable use of forest and "waste" land in the State.

15. The informational and educational activities of the Division of Forestry should be increased by the employment of a full-time assistant to the branch chief, as well as adequate secretarial and photographic assistants.

16. The College of Agriculture should require a minimum of three credit hours in farm forestry of all students who are prospective farmers, farm planners, county agents, or vocational agriculture teachers, in order to provide an understanding of the importance of woodlands in farm economy and some knowledge of their management.

Many of the above recommendations have come to pass. Some are still to be sought and some have since become unnecessary. The Ohio Forestry Association supplied \$1500 to help meet the cost of the survey.

The Ohio Forestry Association and the American Forestry Association entered into a cooperative agreement in 1948 for the promotion of sound forestry practices in Ohio. As a result of this cooperative agreement, the head



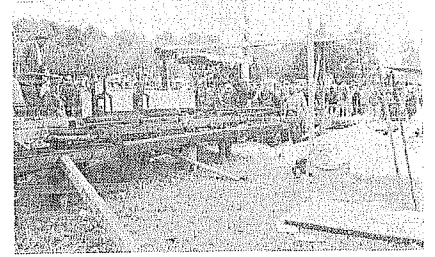

quarters office of the Ohio Forestry Association was established in Columbus with William Laybourne retained as Executive Secretary on July 1, 1948. An action program was placed into effect and the Association's effectiveness gained momentum at every setting of the sun.

The annual budget of the

Association jumped from \$1000 to \$30,000 during 1948-1949. The Tree Farm program was initiated along with the School Forest program, Keep Ohio Green program, and an effective legislative reference program, both in the State Legislature and in the Federal Congress.

The OFA through its various committees, staff, and Board of Trustees provided considerable assistance in the enactment of legislation which created the present Ohio Department of Natural Resources by the passage of S. B. 13. The Department became active on August 11, 1949.

The Association sponsored jointly with the West Virginia Forest Council the 68th Annual Meeting of the American Forestry Association in 1949 which included field trips into Ohio with the Annual Banquet in the Mayflower Hotel in Akron. This meeting terminated at Malabar Farm with the late Louis Bromfield as the personal host.

The OFA established seven County Chapters by April 1950.

In an effort to bring about better forest harvesting practices and better forest management practices in Ohio, the Association during 1950, initiated a plan to enroll as many timber

operators and timberland owners as possible as members of the Association and employed a full-time forester to assist in furthering the Association's educational objectives. Robert R. Paton, still serves as the Association's chief forester.

The American Forestry Association due to financial limitations had to terminate their cooperative financial agreement as of February 15, 1950.

The OFA was privileged to sponsor the dedication and official opening of the facilities of the Lake Hope Dining Lodge and Vacation Cabins at Lake Hope State Park on May 26, 1951. The Board of Trustees held their meeting at the lodge the evening before the dedication and official opening.

These are just a few of the many activities that the Ohio Forestry Association has engaged in endeavoring to further the best interests of forestry in Ohio. No one can doubt the sincerity of its early leaders and the powerful influence it had in the development of the present forestry program.

A list of the early leaders in

The OFA Today

The past speaks for itself. We are now concerned with the future. If the Ohio Forestry Association is to be kept strong and be of influence, it must receive the united support of all interested in Ohio's forests.

The OFA is a private non-profit corporation (a partnership with people to conserve Ohio's natural resources) engaged in an educational program dedicated to the general welfare of the people of Ohio. Its members include: farmers, doctors, lawyers, forester, sawmill operators, growers of Christmas trees, woodland owners, Tree Farmers, bankers, educators, conservationists, agriculturalists, business firms, corpora-

tions, clubs, organizations, etc.

The OFA has members in every county. These members bring to its committees and Board for policy-making the top industrial, business, landowner, and technical brains. They offer for its program and projects a network of vital local contacts and make its efforts dynamically effective at the forks of the creek. The OFA has gained stature and is recognized in State and National circles as a potent influence.

Its Purpose

The purpose of OFA shall be not for profit, but to promote the general welfare of the people and private enterprise of the State of Ohio by encouraging through education a unified conservation program including the multiple use of forests, development of adequate water supplies, application of sound land management, and the development of adequate wildlife and recreational values. (Taken from the Articles of Incorporation)

Its Objectives

1. The development of coordinated watershed efforts within

the natural drainage basins in Ohio through localized action programs.

2. Analyze legislation both State and Federal and present a sound business concept representing private initiative and localized control.

3. The conduct of a general program of education to promote all phases of sound resource use.

4. The development of favorable public opinion.

The OFA is completely democratic in its efforts. It is governed by a responsible Board of Trustees elected by its members. Its program and policies are formulated by working committees made up of technical men, teachers, farmers, timber growers, sawmill operators, industrialists, members of Federal and State bureaus. Their thinking reaches and influences men who can translate it into action.

For its public service program "The Ohio Watershed Conservation Plan", the OFA received national recognition through the presentation of an award by the American Trade Association Executives in 1955. The effects of the development of the plan have been outstanding. Purchase orders for the booklets have been filled in each of the 48 states and in 19 foreign countries. The OFA program has continued to be quite effective.

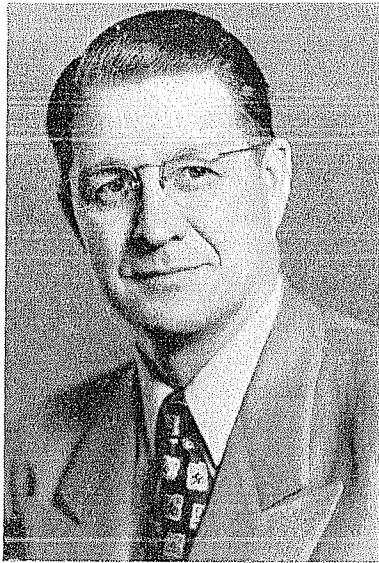

FOREST MANA

“Forest recreation begins in the flower pot upon the window sill, and extends into the most absolute wildness. In each there is the dominance of Nature, the mystery of growth, the outward looking of man feeling his way through a pleasant experience ruled by common sense, knowledge of nature and decency”—
J. V. K. Wagar*

What is recreation, and why is it a state forest resource? There are many definitions of recreation. According to Webster it is, “refreshment of strength and spirit after toil; diversion, or mode of diversion; play.” In what better environment is there in which to recreate one’s strength and spirit, than in a state forest? Such an act thus becomes a resource of the forest, in that it has provided a setting that has enabled an individual to regain his strength, and to improve his spiritual well being. None of which

can be measured by the monetary values, that are used when other forest products are sold.

With all the research, by brilliant scientists, none have yet been able to devise a formula, or an instrument, to measure the benefit to the human spirit, and the release from physical tension, brought about by time spent in the great out-of-doors.

As our population continues to increase, and as new industries come to our state, there will be an ever increasing demand for recreational facilities. State parks will be able to accommodate only so many. Even today many areas are at times, filled beyond capacity. It is therefore conceivable that it will become necessary to expand more and more into state forest lands in order to provide for this need.

State forest lands in Ohio are already being used for recreation. Much of the forest is open to hunting in season. Visitors are welcome to use existing state forest roads and to observe the various forest management operations, as they occur.

Forest lands are supplementing state parks by providing buffer lands, or protection zones, to existing state parks within state forests. Such buffer lands are subject to joint management by the Divisions of Forestry and Parks. As such,

they act as a transition zone between the two types of management, which, although compatible, may be varied according to the management program of each Division.

Some of our outstanding state park areas today are the result of the foresight, understanding and continued protection of dedicated individuals of the Division of Forestry. In Hocking State Park located in Hocking State Forest, you will find an outstanding example of what early acquisition, and protection, has done to preserve one of the state's outstanding scenic areas. Had not, Ash Cave, Oldman's Cave, Cantwells Cliffs, Cedar Falls and Conkles Hollow been acquired years ago, and kept intact under Forest Management, it is conceivable that others might have preempted them, and this asset so valuable for inspiration and relaxation, would not be available to the public today.

We must recognize that in recreating ourselves in state forests it will be necessary to rely upon our own initiative in caring for personal needs. Unlike state parks developed facilities are not available, and it therefore becomes obligatory for the individual using the area, to be versatile enough to provide for his own comfort.

While state forests have a recreation potential, we must not overlook the basic reason for their establishment, i.e., soil and water conservation. In their management adherence to this policy will dominate, therefore, recreation must become a lesser interest. However, the latter

may take its proper place in the overall picture, and thus contribute its share to the economic value of the forest.

Recreation then becomes a resource of the forest, taking its proper place in the management plan for these areas; supplementing the income received from sale of forest products, conserving our soil and waters; and above all its intangible value to the human soul and body.

These values are so ably expressed in the immortal writings of Ralph Waldo Emerson when he penned these words. "At the gates of the forest the surprised man of the world is forced to leave this city estimates of great and small, wise or foolish. The knapsack of custom falls from his back with the first step he takes into these

precincts. Here is sanctity which shames our religious, and reality which discredits our heroes. Here we find Nature to be the circumstance which dwarfs every other circumstance and judges, like God, all men who come to her. We have crept out of our close and crowded houses into the night and morning, and we see what majestic beauties daily wrap us in their bosom."

Today as in the days of Emerson, our state forests and the state parks within their bounds, still stand ready to provide many hours of inspiration and recreation, and open to all who wish to avail themselves of the privilege.

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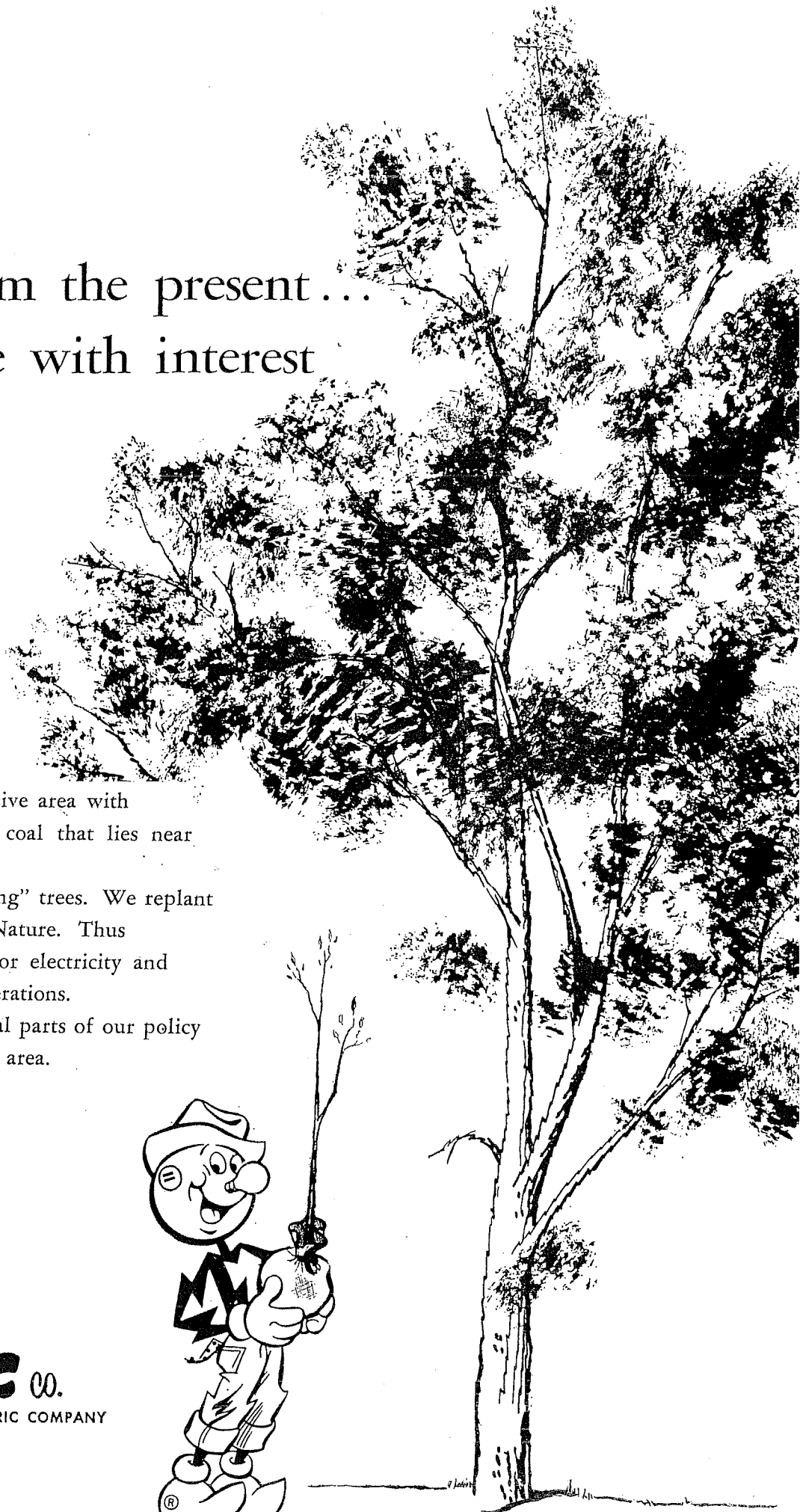
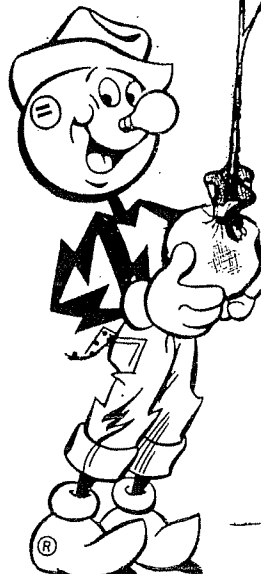
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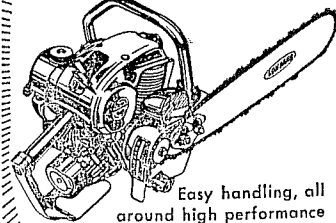


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Planting For The Future

The Ohio Reclamation Association, an organization representing the surface mining operators (coal, gravel, clay, limestone, etc.), was organized July 31, 1945. Its primary purpose then and now is to advise its members on the land reclamation activities affecting their operations and to service its members in those reclamation activities as directed. Its primary services to its members include: land and water reclamation service; aerial mapping; land and water use studies; grading recommendations; planting and seeding, fish stocking; and land management.

During the twelve years, the Association has participated in many activities which have tended to strengthen the State's basic economic structure: (1) The development of species adaptation tests in order to find the best combination of species to plant. This has been in cooperation with the Central States Forest Experiment Station since 1945. (2) Sponsorship of agronomic and horticultural research on strip mine lands through cooperative agreement with the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station. (3) Cooperation in the sponsorship of research in prevention of acid mine water pollution by Mellon Institute of Industrial Research. (4) Sponsorship of research in wildlife on strip mine lands through grants to Ohio State University.

During the twelve years, its principal function has been the revegetation of strip mine lands for its member operators. The following is a capitulation of the activity in this field:
